# Child friendly Anti-Bullying Policy

You should all feel safe in school and know that you can speak to school staff if you feel unsafe.

Bullying is <u>behaviour</u> done by one <u>person</u> or a group, more than once, which is meant to hurt a <u>person</u> or group's body or feelings.

Bullying is different to teasing because it is meant to hurt someone, happens lots, and to someone who finds it hard to make it stop.

### Bullying includes:

- Name calling.
- Winding up.
- Making rude comments.
- Hitting and kicking.
- Taking or damaging people's things.
- Online (cyber) bullying sending nasty texts, pictures and emails.
- Making rude graffiti.
- Gossiping and spreading nasty lies.
- Leaving people out of groups.

## Types of bullying can be:

- Linked to what you believe in and where you are from.
- Linked to needing extra help to learn in school and to move around.
- Linked to how you look.
- Linked to how you feel about other people.
- Linked to who you live with and where.
- Linked to being a boy or a girl.

### What school will do about bullying:

- Talk to everyone involved
- Talk to parents
- Decide on the best way to stop it and put things right
- Decide on the consequences
- Keep checking that the bullying has stopped
- Make sure parents know.

# Miss Seward is in charge of the anti-bullying policy - this means that she:

- Makes sure all bullying is reported properly and looked in to.
- Makes sure staff know what to do.
- Looks into ways to stop bullying happening.

### Ways we can all try to stop bullying from happening:

- Reward good behaviour and punish bad behaviour
- Talk about it in our classes so we know what it is, how to spot bullying, and how to report
   it
- Have an anti-bullying week in November to remind everyone about the rules
- Do classwork on cyber bullying and internet safety
- Have a School Council that pupils can talk to

- Have playground buddies for younger children to talk to
  Have Listening Ear sessions for pupils to talk in
